Describe experiences and positions you have, or currently hold, in the church and the world that will have helped you prepare for serving in this position:

What sustains you in your spiritual life?

What sustains me the most in my spiritual life is praying every night, serving and worshipping with my parish, and spreading the love of Christ to others. As a member of the Order of the Daughters of the King® and a student in the lay worship leader course, I have felt my relationship with the Lord grow in ways that I have never before experienced, and it has made my commitment to God and His people that much stronger.
